Our firm is currently representing a family in a wrongful death case against FPL. The family's teenage son was picking mangos in a tree of a backyard using a pool skimmer. The tree's foliage obstructed his view of the power line that ran through it and our client was electrocuted and died. The owners of the property adjacent to the trees notified the power company several times that the mango trees were over grown and needed to be pruned but FPL failed to respond or correct the dangerous situation.

Dashboard Warning Lights



Do you know what this symbol means? If not, you are not alone - 46% of drivers couldn't figure out that the icon represents a tire that is 25% below the manufacturers recommended pressure. This warning indicator is now required on all vehicles starting with the 2008 model year.

Proper tire pressure maintenance is key to safe driving - improves the steering, stopping, traction, and load-carrying capability of your vehicle.

It is recommended that you make a habit of checking your vehicle's tire pressure every time you fill your car or truck up with gasoline. Do you know where to check for your vehicle's recommended tire pressure and load limits? Placards and certification labels are permanently attached to the vehicle door edge, door post, glove-box door, or inside of the trunk lid. You can also find the recommended tire pressure and load limit for your vehicle in the vehicle owner's manual.

Distracted Driving Worse than Drunk Driving

A [recent report](#) shows that distracted driving is more dangerous than DUI. A new safety campaign, **Two-Second Turnoff Day**, is being launched by Seventeen magazine, AAA and the Department of Transportation to raise awareness and reduced the number of accidents and deaths caused by distracted driving. The campaign asks cell phone users to take two seconds to turn off their cell phone before driving.
